Perth is a long way from the other cities, in Western Australia by the Indian Ocean. The land in the west has plenty of gold, oil, and valuable minerals, so Perth is a rich city.

Sydney, in New South Wales, is the oldest and biggest city in Australia. Many people know of **Sydney Opera House**. The roof of this beautiful building looks like sails.

Adelaide, in South Australia, is called the City of Churches, and it is also famous for its WOMADelaide festival of world music and dance.

Canberra is the newest of the Australian cities, and its name is an **Aboriginal** word meaning 'meeting place'. It is the home of many important national buildings, like **Parliament House**.

Although **Wellington** is not the largest city, it is the capital. It is built on high hills and parts of The Lord of the Rings were filmed in and around Wellington.

Christchurch is a flat, green place. One third of the city is parks and gardens, and it is called the 'Garden City'.

In the south-west of the South Island is **Fiordland**, where land and sea meet in deep valleys. At Milford Sound you can take a boat trip and see the mountains and forests from the water.

The most southern city is **Dunedin**, which is the old name for Edinburgh in Scotland. In the nineteenth century it was the hub of New Zealand's business and its largest city.
