# Answer key: Task 3:

memo – an official note from one person to another in the same organisation (dopis) alias – used when a person is known by two names (David Bowie alias The White Duke) via – through a place or by means of a system (e.g. I've sent some ideas via the Internet.) alibi – evidence that proves that a person was in another place at the time of the crime versus – used to show that two teams or sides are opposed (against each other); abbreviation vs or v with or without full stop

agenda – a plan of things to be done or discussed at the meetings (dnevni red, plan rada) veto – the right to refuse to allow something to be done (like stop the law or decision)
