Ten Golden Writing Tips



- 1 Always stick to the topic of your essay. (Don't write about anything else.)
- 2 Write to the point and avoid repetition. (Don't use words/phrases similar to those you have already used.)
- 3 Use key sentences in your draft text. (Build up your essay around them.)
- 4 Give a general view (what some/most people think about the topic).
- 5 Give a personal view (your opinion you may agree or disagree with the others).
- 6 Tell a short story or give examples (from your life or general knowledge).
- 7 Write in three distinct paragraphs: short lead-in, long main part, short conclusion.
- 8 Use some standard words (linkers, sentence starters) and useful phrases.
- 9 Fully answer all the questions in order. Use the same words as in the questions.
- 10 Have the given number of words in your composition.
